HISTORICAL NOTE

Owen W. Bombard, born in 1922 in Au Sable Forks, New York, received undergraduate and masters degrees from New York State College. While working towards a PhD at Columbia University, he trained with Allan Nevins in the Oral History Research Office. Bombard was hired by the Ford Motor Company in 1950 to head an Oral History Section designed to enrich the historical record already housed in the newly formed Ford Motor Company Archives. The mission of the section, according to a 1952 Bombard speech to the American Historical Association, was "to increase the quantity and quality of historical sources – to reduce the number of 'blank spots' which have forced both management and scholars to make decisions or draw conclusions based on fragmentary documentation." When the project was concluded in 1958, Bombard continued working for the Ford Motor Company, serving in various public relations departments.

SCOPE AND CONTENT NOTE

The Chronological information files subseries, 1863-1958 (1.6 cubic ft. and 5 card files), is comprised of several sets of chronological histories of the Ford Motor Company and the life of Henry Ford. Researchers should note that there is much overlap among the sets and that the Main Chronologies are the most thoroughly organized. The Main Chronologies subsubseries includes files arranged around Greenfield Village, Henry Ford, and the Ford Motor Company. The latter is primarily organized by function, and includes aviation, branch operations, engineering, finance, industrial relations, legal, manufacturing, public relations, purchasing, and sales. The Miscellaneous Chronologies subsubseries is comprised of two sets. Subjects in the first set include Ford Motor Company Archives, Henry Ford and camping, Edsel Ford, Greenfield Village, Henry and racing, Ford residences and Ford trips. Subjects in the second include Ford firsts, Ford employees, 1904-1953, industrial relations, northern Michigan operations, radio broadcasting and a set of files prepared by Virgil LaMarre of the Ford Motor Company News Bureau. In addition to these various sets of files, there is a Card Files subsubseries, which is comprised of handwritten and typewritten notes. The first box relates primarily to the company; a second box is chronological, including Henry Ford itineraries; and a third box relates to Henry Ford.
